Considering COVID-19 when interpreting the Performance Summary

The Victorian community's experience of COVID-19 had a significant impact on normal school operations over the past three years. This impacted the conduct of assessments and surveys. For example, in 2020 and 2021 school-based surveys ran under changed circumstances, and NAPLAN was not conducted in 2020. What do 'Similar Schools' refer to?

Similar Schools are a group of Victorian government schools with similar characteristics to the school.

This grouping of schools has been created by comparing each school's socio-economic background of students, the number of non-English speaking students and the school's size and location.

What does 'NDP' or 'NDA' mean?

'NDP' refers to no data being published for privacy reasons or where there are insufficient underlying data. For example, very low numbers of participants or characteristics that may lead to identification will result in an 'NDP' label.

'NDA' refers to no data being available. Some schools have no data for particular measures due to low enrolments. There may be no students enrolled in some year levels, so school comparisons are not possible.

Note that new schools only have the latest year of data and no comparative data from previous years. The department also recognises unique circumstances in Specialist, Select Entry, English Language, Community Schools and schools that changed school type recently, where school-to-school comparisons are not appropriate.

What is the 'Victorian Curriculum'?

The Victorian Curriculum F–10 sets out what every student should learn during his or her first eleven years of schooling. The curriculum is the common set of knowledge and skills required by students for life-long learning, social development and active and informed citizenship.

The Victorian Curriculum is assessed through teacher judgements of student achievement based on classroom learning.

The curriculum has been developed to ensure that school subjects and their achievement standards enable continuous learning for all students, including students with disabilities.

The 'Towards Foundation Level Victorian Curriculum' is integrated directly into the curriculum and is referred to as 'Levels A to D'.

'Levels A to D' may be used for students with disabilities or students who may have additional learning needs. These levels are not associated with any set age or year level that links chronological age to cognitive progress (i.e., there is no age expected standard of achievement for 'Levels A to D').



School context

Yarragon Primary School & Early Learning Centre (ELC) is beautifully situated within the growing township of Yarragon. The school has a purp classroom spaces. In 2022 the school had 13.80 FTE teaching staff, including a full time Principal and 8.25 ES staff, including Education Support working in class 230. Yarragon is a growing school community.

The school also manages the ELC which implements both 3 and 4 year old kindergarten sessions. Five staff members work in various capaciti school Strategic Plan and Annual Implementation Improvement Plans.

Parents have an opportunity to be involved in many aspects of the school community. The schools Parents and Friends Association and the Bright partnerships are highly regarded by the School Council, students, staff and wider school community. Yarragon Primary School & ELC is an interest of the school community.

Leadership development, low absenteeism and a strong focus on numeracy through the implementation of Professional Learning Communities Learning Specialist supports building teacher capacity and knowledge. Reading, writing and numeracy trackers have been developed and implementation of student outcomes and learning growth. Over the past two years student reading growth has been positive with a higher percenta Agile Leadership Development Course in 2022. Leadership tools and strategies will continue to be implemented in 2023.

Progress towards strategic goals, student outcomes and student engagement

Learning

The school implements a workshop model that identifies Hight Impact Teaching strategies within an hour focused learning block F-6. Practice in feedback.

In 2022 teacher judgement in English Foundation-Grade 6 for age expected standards was slightly below both similar and state averages. Yarragon teacher judgement in Mathematics Foundation-Grade 6 for age expected standards was also below both similar and state averages. Yarragon continue to review and improve moderation processes and also cross-check student performance against school wide data trackers, aligned to judgement is below both similar schools and state average, yet NAPLAN data indicates more students are above expected standards, in partice Grade 3 NAPLAN data for reading in 2022 was extremely positive. The school also recognises this cohort experienced remote and online learn with 78.3% of students performing in the top 3 bands of NAPLAN, compared to similar schools at 70.4% and the state at 76.6%. Grade 5 data for NAPLAN, compared to similar schools at 67.3% and the state at 70.2%. The school recognises this cohort has received extensive intervention important to note that NAPLAN learning gain for this cohort from Grade 3 to 5 last year is very strong, despite a lower percentage of students performed in the top 3 bands of NAPLAN, compared to significant focus in 2022 with a whole school first hour numeracy block implemented from 9-10am Foundation to Grade 6. Grade 5 data for mathematics was also positive at 54.2%. Intervention will continue to be implemented for many students in 2023 as they enter

Wellbeing

A holistic approach to wellbeing is implemented across the school. Staff have completed Berry Street Educational Model training, building know Wellbeing Officer and Wellbeing Coordinator completed Smiling Mind training. Smiling Mind strategies will be implemented Foundation - Grade



Yarragon Primary School

In 2022 Attitude to School Survey data for Sense of Connectedness dropped from results in previous years. This was very surprising to staff where school returning to onsite in 2022. Learning stamina, relationship building and resilience were key factors considered. In 2022 Sense of Conwill continue to implement universal strategies for wellbeing, focusing on consistent and predictable routines, Zones of Regulation and Smiling In 2022 the positive percentage for the Management of Bullying was 59.3%, compared to similar schools at 75.9% and the state percentage at managing bullying at school. E-smart, Respectful Relationships curriculum and other resources to support understanding and eliminating bullying 2022 increased according to the Attitude to School Survey data. This is very pleasing. In 2022 86% of students did not experience bullying, con increase in the percentage of students not experiencing bullying and will strive for this upward trend to continue.

Engagement

The school implements a Tiered Intervention Model to support positive school attendance. An Attendance Data Wall also supports staff to track continue to be a priority focus in 2023.

Attendance data results indicates that Yarragon Primary School's four year average continues to be below both similar schools and state. In 20 state at 17.0%. This is very positive data as the school has worked very hard to communicate the importance of attendance to our community the from the 4 year average to 21.5%. This percentage is still below similar schools at 23.4% and the state at 23.3%. Our school and community restudent Absence Plans were implemented for at risk students with high attendance percentages. The school will continue to work closely with a 12022 the Parent Opinion Survey - Parent Satisfaction component positive endorsement was 69.9% compared to the state percentage of 79.00 channels belween the school and parent community. In 2022 a new digital sign was purchased to promote school events and communication to which connects student learning and wellbeing to families. This platform will continue in 2023.












Percentage of students in the top three bands of testing in NAPLAN.










